Introduction and Course Description

The goal of this course is to familiarize students with the world's geographic diversity. Simply put, we want to understand how and why the world is organized the way it is. We will examine physical geographic processes and the human adaptations to those processes. We will study the diverse conditions of the everyday lives of people as well as comprehend the larger political, economic, social, and physical conditions that mediate their existence. Moreover, we want to understand the relationships between the social and spatial organization of society, and how the social world is organized in and through particular places, such as cities, nations, virtual communities, etc. It is assumed that students do not have any prior background or familiarity with the interactions of people and their environments in these areas or with contemporary problems of social change and dislocation of the peoples of across the globe.

Evaluation

Assignments and VoiceThread Discussions: Assignments are individually-based and include submitting completed work to DropBox. In addition, each student will participate in a VoiceThread discussion based on their assignment each week. Each combined Assignment and VoiceThread Discussion is worth 20 points per week.

TOTAL VALUE = 300 points

Weekly Content Quizzes: These quizzes are based on video lectures and readings and include short answer questions. Each *Content Quiz* is 10 questions, worth 10 points.

TOTAL VALUE = 150 points

Weekly Map Quizzes: These quizzes are based on maps and figures in the textbook. It is essential that you have the most up-to-date edition of the book (5th) to be successful on these quizzes. Map and Figure numbers and pages are provided to you in advance and during the quiz. Each *Map Quiz* is 10 questions, worth 10 points.

TOTAL VALUE = 150 points

Writing Assignments: There will be TWO longer writing assignments that assess your ability to synthesize course material and apply it to the core concepts in the course. These writing assignments will help you complete your final VoiceThread presentation. Each writing assignment will be worth 125 points. The first writing assignment is due: *Monday, February 2, 2015 at 8AM.* Writing assignments are to be submitted as Word Documents (.doc) to the appropriate DropBox folder in D2L.

TOTAL VALUE = 250 points

Final VoiceThread Presentation: Each student will upload a final, five-minute oral presentation on their discussion of an emerging world region that is currently not identified in the book.

TOTAL VALUE = 150 points

GRADING

The grades in the course will be determined through an average of exams and online exercises. There will be no curve for the course (although individual examinations may be curved). The total possible points for the course are **1,000**. Final grades will be given as follows:
